2011 News

Once again the USDFD would like to thank the Gayla Driving Center for holding its annual Gayla Bluegrass CDE as a fundraiser for USDFD, successfully raising just under \$1,000 despite the struggling economy.

We are also pleased to report that we have had several opportunities to help educate the public about adaptive driving. This year we have worked with the Universal Access Program Aide Department of the Environmental Conservation Division of Lands and Forests in Albany, NY, to help them make accommodations for mobility challenged individuals wishing to visit historical sites in the Adirondacks that are closed to motor vehicles.

USDFD and Gayla Driving Center also have been providing a place for a local Lexington program, Central Kentucky Riding for Hope, offering some of its students more driving opportunities, teaching them about driven dressage, cones, and driving out in Kentucky's bluegrass.

USDFD also worked with the new Foot Hills Therapeutic Equestrian Center located at a southern KY army base, providing information about available adaptive equipment, carriages, and the qualities a suitable driving horse should exhibit. This program also works in conjunction with the Bluegrass Army Depot, the Eastern Kentucky Universitys' Veterans Club, and PATH's affiliate program Horses for Heros to serve injured war veterans through facilitating equine assistive activities and therapies.

Para-Equestrian Clinic

In October of 2011 USDFD hosted a Para-Equestrian Clinic for drivers hoping to represent the USA in this year's upcoming FEI Para-Equestrian World Championships to be held in Breda, The Netherlands.

Held at the Gayla Driving Center, the clinic was taught by head trainer Sterling Graburn and FEI judge Debbie Banfield who both graciously donated their time. It was attended by Pam Johnson of MO, and Boo Finch West of VA. Sterling and Debbie combined their efforts to help both drivers address their goals of improving their dressage skills.

The USDFD would like to congratulate both drivers on their success at the Fall Kentucky Classic CDE. Boo placed First in Preliminary single pony out of a class of sixteen and after just moving up to Intermediate Level Pam was able to place third. Again, we want to send a BIG congratulations to two of our own.




Therapeutic Driving Instructor Workshop & Certification

In November of 2011 Gayla Driving Center hosted a USDFD/PATH (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International) workshop/certification program for therapeutic driving instructors, gathering participants from all across the country. The attendance was the largest in history, operating at PATH's maximum allowed capacity with ten people participating in the three day workshop along with four auditors, eight people taking the three day Therapeutic Driving Instructor certification, and six complete turnouts to work with.

Each year the number of Therapeutic Riding Centers interested in offering driving grows, leaving us struggling to accommodate the need for certified instructors. This year alone we had to put twenty-five people on the waiting list. Though we are sorry to keep them waiting, we are happy that interest is increasing!

Bev White Bio:

Bev got her first horse in 1966, began showing her Quarter Horse in 1967, and continued the equine adventure with her daughters in 4-H and youth classes, and with her granddaughters showing Pinto and Paint. She discovered carriage driving when the first mini joined the family, followed by ponies and carriages, trailers and trucks and Gabe, an employee/surrogate son/friend who makes it possible to compete and his brother Manuel who keeps the barn and equipment in immaculate condition and navigates for the mini team with his brother.

Diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis in 1979, Bev progressed from studying and teaching Jazz Dance and running three miles a day to riding around in a scooter and continually seeking better adaptive equipment on and off the carriage. She often bemoans the fact that she did not know USDFD could help with that search and could have saved her from many costly errors in creating and purchasing carriages and safety devices. It is her goal to facilitate that process for new drivers with disabilities through finding ways to make them aware of this resource early in their search.

Bev worked with her husband in their construction business for fifteen years. After doing the Executive Secretary bit for mortgage and insurance companies for a few years, she went back to school, earned a B.S. in Psychology with honors, was awarded membership in Phi Beta Kappa, followed by a M.S. in Clinical Psychology and work in community mental health and private practice. Retired, she volunteers as a Docent at the Portland Art Museum and for the Independent Living Program in her region, furnishing apartments and making Christmas for youth aging out of foster care. She organizes the CDE at Inavale in Oregon each July.

She is delighted to join the Board of Trustees of USDFD and hopes to help find ways to introduce new drivers with disabilities to the resources USDFD can make available to them and support them in the quest to someday join Team USA.

Hi, I have been a life long equestrian with a background in dressage and some jumping. At the age of 22, I purchased my first horse after graduating from University of California, Santa Cruz with a Bachelor's degree in Computer Science. I had planned on riding the trails. Then, at the age of 24 I was in a car accident, which left me paralyzed from the waist down. That was 20 years ago. I wasn't sure what to do, but I knew it was going to involve my horse. I started back riding one year after my injury at a NARHA riding program REINS. It was great, but not very satisfying.

I wanted speed and no boundaries. I managed to buy a used cart and a harness from a catalog, went to a clinic, bought a book, and taught my trail horse to pull the cart, all from a wheelchair. I had a few misguided friends (I can only say that now because I have learned so much more) who helped me in my endeavors. A few mishaps involving a pig and a bent shaft made me finally decide that the trail horse was not to be a driving animal. I then looked at a broodmare I had and she learned to drive when she was pregnant, then I decided to teach her first born to drive. By now I had a road cart and my original cart and a 3 year old mare, I went to a show and found out about the American Driving Society and discovered Combined Driving. With the help of a few mentors along the way (Hardy Zantke, Jody Cutler and Mickie Bowen) I was hooked.

I spent the first year 1998–1999 making rule changes with the ADS to allow the disabled to use a vehicle to view the obstacles and hazards. I am ecstatic to say this is commonplace now, and thrilled at the various competitors who have been able to make use of these accommodations.

I found out about the World Championships for disabled drivers in 1998, and made it my goal to make the team. I was not successful in 2000, but I went in the following years. In 2002 I won an Individual Silver-Team Bronze, 2004 5th place, in 2006 Individual Gold, in 2008 Individual Bronze-Team Silver. In the states I compete with a single, a pair, and tandem. I have shown FEI level single and pair, and have been long listed for the National Singles team. I have done many demonstrations to support driving for the disabled. Whether it is a local riding group or an international three day event or the World Equestrian Games, I promote the sport. Most of the competitions I attend are in the Western part of the United States as I live in California, but I have gone back East to compete and enjoyed it very much. The driving community is

I plan on driving seven days a week, but life does get in the way and I average five days a week. I have learned that I should not train my horses completely myself, and prefer someone else to hook them for the first month or two. I spend my hours working as a software engineer when I'm not out with the horses, I also teach lessons and clinics on driving. I have been the treasurer of Brass Oak Driving Society in San Luis ObispoCounty, CA for the past few years.

Driving excites me and I wish to share that with as many people as I can.

Team USA update:

Team USA is off to a great start in planning and acquiring equipment for this year's Para-Equestrian World Championships to be held in Breda, The Netherlands. We have created a selection committee and have contacted people for the position of coach and chef d'equipe. These names will be submitted to USEF for consideration for the 2012 team. The selection criteria has been edited and submitted to USEF and will hopefully be available to drivers soon.

Thanks to some great friends and wonderful contacts we have firm commitments from fellow drivers of suitable horses and ponies that will be available to lease in the Netherlands. Various carriages and harnesses will also be made available, and a suitable training facility has also been located. With a lot of work from our Team USA Chair Diane Kastama and a fabulous bunch of people willing to donate we are well on our way to having everything we need to send another medal-winning Team! Team USA would also like to send a special thanks to Gerard Paagman of Ideal Harness for his help with this endeavor. His great energy, contacts, and selfless offering of personal resources has already been indispensable to this year's Team.

The Team USA Fundraising Dilemma

USDFD has two major goals this year: to increase our educational push by sponsoring more opportunities for new instructors to become PATH Certified, thus providing more driving opportunities to new drivers, and to help send a Team to the Para-Equestrian World Driving Championships in Breda, The Netherlands in August.

Money has been allocated to put on several PATH Certification Clinics this year and we are in the process of identifying prospective instructors and clinic locations. The Board is very excited about this initiative and looks forward to increased driving opportunities across the country.


To reach our second goal, the Board has allocated \$10,000 toward the cost of sending a team to the World Driving Championships. The cost of funding a team is approximately \$50,000. In the past, team members have received some support from USDFD, none from USEF and a little from ADS. The majority of the cost to compete has fallen to the individual team members. In 2010 we did not send a Team as prospective Team members faced the same financial issues as the rest of the country. This year we are planning to apply for small grants from USEF, ADS and the Christopher Reeves Foundation, but even with these grants, individuals named to the Team must raise the remainder of the funds necessary to attend. USDFD and drivers in general benefit from the increased exposure and attention gained in a Championship year. Our Team represents all of us at the Championships, provides inspiration to new drivers and a long term goal to current drivers. Just as not all able-bodied drivers aspire or have the talent to be on a USEF Driving Team, not all disabled drivers aspire or have the ability to be on our Para-Equestrian Team, but by sending a Team we highlight the sport and bring awareness of the possibilities. Our Team needs your financial support so we are asking that you think about ways you might help, either by making a donation to the Team or by putting on a fundraising event in your area. Together we can ensure that the United States is represented at this years World Championships.
